### **Project Updates - Electronic Waste**

Electronic waste consultant **Anne Peters, Gracestone, Inc.,** has been working closely with SIPP since 2016. Last month, Anne presented a paper (<u>"Scrap Struggle in the Holy Land"</u>) at the 2017 E-Scrap Conference in Orlando, Florida, where it was received with great interest. The paper, also published in E-Scrap News, an industry trade journal, related to her work on behalf of SIPP, including a series of trainings and meetings last fall in the **West Bank** and **Tel**

## Nidal Allis - Techno Rescue, Inc. Visit To the Region, Fall 2017

Nidal Allis, who owns and operates an environmentally compliant and growing electronic waste recycling business near Denver, Techno Rescue, Inc., is travelling this month to the region to see how he can support ongoing efforts of the Green Land Society for Health (GLS, a Palestinian NGO), and the Arab-Jewish Center for Equality, Empowerment and



Cooperation-Negev Institute for Strategies of Peace and Development (AJEEC-NISPED, an Israeli NGO), and to explore possible business opportunities on both sides of the border. SIPP is helping Nidal coordinate his trip.

# Project Updates - Pollution and Recycling in the Kidron

SIPP is planning another trip to the region in January, 2018, with several goals in mind:

 To help define the sources of pollution that are contaminating the drinking water at the historically and religiously significant Mar Saba Monastery, east of Jerusalem, Board members Peter Ornstein and Bernard Amadei will walk the watershed and consult with local engineers to help generate options to divert and treat upstream sewage.

 To identify an appropriate intern candidate from the West Bank who would spend several weeks in Boulder at Eco-Cycle learning about US



waste and recycling processes, Peter and Bernard will meet with waste management professionals and the Mayor of Al Ubeidiya. Our expectation is that the intern will be able to take that knowledge and apply it to his/her community.

To develop a recycling program involving students and their families,
 Peter and Bernard will meet with school principals and the manager of the
 Al Menya landfill.

### Meet Our Board Members: Bernard Amadei

Professor of Civil Engineering at the University of Colorado at Boulder.

SIPP welcomes new Board Member Bernard Amadei. Dr. Amadei has been on the CU-Boulder faculty in the Department of Civil,



Environmental and Architectural Engineering for 35 years, with teaching and research interests in geological engineering and international development.


Dr. Amadei is the Founding President of Engineers Without Borders- USA as well as the co-founder of the Engineers Without Borders-International network. Dr. Amadei holds the Mortenson Endowed Chair in Global Engineering and serves as a Faculty Co-Director of the Mortenson Center in Engineering for Developing Communities. In both 2013 and 2014 Dr. Amadei served as a Science Envoy to Pakistan and Nepal for the U.S. Department of State. CU Chancellor Phil DiStefano described Amadei as having "distinguished himself as an educator, a humanitarian and a global citizen."

Why SIPP? Dr. Amadei has always been interested in the topics of sustainability and global development. He has demonstrated his passion for humanitarian action through environmental and socially sustainable projects. Dr. Amadei stresses to his students his belief in an engineer's obligation of "doing good" and that it is an engineer's responsibility to use his or her skills to help developing communities. In a past speech at Drexel University, Dr. Amadei defined the new generation of global engineers for the 21st century as changemakers, peacemakers, social entrepreneurs, and facilitators of sustainable human development.
