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Recent Events

Despite the COVID pandemic and recent violence within Israel and between Israelis and Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank, there is hope. SIPP and our partners continue to move forward with grassroots projects that address real issues faced by Israelis and Palestinians.

Computers are being refurbished for use by children in the West Bank. Bedouin women are learning Hebrew. Israeli Jewish children are learning Arabic from Israeli Arab University students. Palestinian, Israeli, Jordanians, and Emirati participants met to discuss regional environmental issues. Bedouin youth are riding bicycles. Israeli and Palestinian communities are experimenting with the use of small biodiogesters to convert farm waste and compost to gas for cooking. Palestinian schools are catching and reusing rainwater. Our partners have been busy!
